

Art drives conversation. What some people love, others detest. The conversation around the four public art pieces at Phase 3's Genesis project has begun. After review, The Public Art Committee recommended the council approve the works.

Public art enters Brisbane's collection in two ways. Private non residential and non live work buildings with development costs above five million dollars contribute at least one percent of their development costs to the Brisbane public art fund as an in-lieu contribution. Alternatively, at the owner or developer's discretion, such projects may devote an amount equal to at least one percent of



The Brisbane Library Community Room was full of blooms and greenery on August 26 as Brisbane residents competed for awards in fourteen gardening categories. Revived in 2021 by the Park and Rec Commission, the garden show started in the 1960s when a group of avid gardeners formed the Brisbane Garden Club, led by Lillian Echols. The club encouraged each other and promoted beautiful gardens all over Brisbane.

With the construction of the Community Center in 1982, the Garden Club hosted a garden show. According to Leesa Greenlee, reviver of our current garden show and Parks and Recreation Commissioner "the show was both modest and impressive. Using beer bottles as vases and folding tables for displays, the whole town got to see the fruits of their labor. The club invited everyone to enter and compete for the "Best of in many categories. After the sec ret judging, the doors opened, revealing bright 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place ribbons."

The club held annual shows until 2001 when it went dormant until restored by the Park and Rec

Now, I am proud to announce that MEHKO has created 32 new businesses and has become a permanent reality in San Mateo County with action the Board took at its Sept. 12 meeting.

She lost tens of thousands a year in wages and could no longer contribute to the family's income like she could before. She was looking for a new path and wanted to work but because of certain disabilities she was just unable to.

But Mary is one incredible cook I can tell you who has always hosted big dinners for family

and friends with super healthy food. But before MEHKO, if Mary wanted to sell any of her delicious meals, she would have been literally breaking the

In 2021, she heard about San Mateo County's MEHKO pilot, applied for the program, took all the tests and certifications required by the state and county and passed them all.

Now she is the proud owner of Mary's Small Kitchen in San Mateo. She can work on her time, decide her own menus and even serve people in her home hot home-cooked delicious meals such as meat loaf, lasagnas and her famous grilled chicken sandwiches.

Her home is routinely inspected by Environmental Health to ensure the food she prepares is just as safe as it would be at any restaurant.

This has taken many home cooks out of the shadows and can generate up to \$3 million a year in economic activity. Now we can uplift these businesses, many of which were started in the middle of the pandemic when many people were out of work and struggling to pay the rent.

This also gives people an opportunity to perhaps get into the restaurant or catering business in the future. No one is getting rich from this but perhaps helping to pay some of the bills such as rent or clothes for their children.

If you look at the roster of home cooks you see they are spread throughout the county from Brisbane and Menlo Park, San Mateo, Daly City and more.

You also see that 84 percent of these businesses are owned by women, which shows the need and importance of MEHKO. This is about the Mary's of the world. Uplifting those in need and helping them succeed when they otherwise thought they couldn't.

Congratulations to all the home cooks out there who have created small businesses and for feeding our communities.

their building development costs to acquire and install publicly accessible art on their site. In this case, the developer chooses the artist and the location.

The second way art enters Brisbane's collection is through the Public Art Committee's use of public art funds (those from in-lieu contributions) to solicit works from artists on public city-owned property. In this case, it drafts a Request for Proposal (RFP), which identifies the area where the work will go, information about the community, the budget, and, if applicable, the existing vision for the space. The RFP is posted on several sites so artists are aware of the opportunity, the committee reviews the applicants, interviews finalists, and selects an artist. The artist often solicits feedback from the community and the committee before finishing their piece.

The committee never hires or solicits an artist outside of the RFP process in order to be fair to all. All projects have an application process except for developer-chosen pieces.

Alternatively to the RFP process, as is with the Phase 3 project, the committee also evaluates art purchased by developers. These developers commission the art and place it on their private property instead of making an in lieu contribution. In this instance, the process with the Public Art Committee works differently. The committee primarily ensures that the art is durable, the developer spends the correct amount, the art is accessible, and the art is not offensive, etc., rather than being intimately involved in selecting the artist.

In both instances, after the committee approves the art to move forward, the piece comes to the council for final approval.

At the September 7th city council meeting, the council voted to approve four new public art installations at Phase 3's Sierra Point Project at 3000, 3300, and 3500 Marina Blvd. The project is the first to move through the Public Art Committee. Because the developer will place the art on their



property, they can contract with an artist they choose.

Phase 3 commissioned Ivan McLean to create a massive Carbon Dioxide molecule made of metal for their central courtyard. The molecule will be situated on a landscaped pedestal and cast incredible shadows depending on the light. The central orb is 20 feet in diameter and made of Cor-Ten. The two orbs, representing oxygen, are crafted from stainless steel.

Phase 3 also purchased three human like bronze figures from artist Curt Brill and will position them throughout the campus. They are exaggerated and abstract human forms.

When asked why Phase 3 CEO Neil Fox chose the works, he explaine d that Carbon Dioxide should be at the forefront of our thoughts due to its driving force in climate change. While some questioned the selection of this particular molecule, Fox said that we should all be reminded of our carbon footprint and hopes that the piece will serve as a reminder to those visiting the property. Fox chose the sculptures by Curt Brill because the biotech tenants that will inhabit Phase 3's buildings all focus their work on the human body. He wanted something that paid homage to the work done in the surrounding buildings.

Now that the public is forming opinions on the pieces, some love the art, and some hate it. As with fashion, architecture, food, design, and almost anything, everyone has different preferences. While we all have our tastes, I hope in time, there will be such a wide variety of art throughout Brisbane that there will be something you love. The art committee will solicit some of the pieces, and some will come from developers. This framework for selection and procurement will hopefully lead to a diverse collection of art.

BLAST FROM BRISBANE'S PAST

The following article is taken from *The Brisbane News Bulletin*, A Brisbane Chamber of Commerce publication, printed March 15, 1949

An Open Letter to Herb Caen and The Editor of The San Francisco Chronicle

In reference to your article in the March 14th issue of the Chronicle, The little town of Brisbane looks like just another ho hum hamlet to me but our Cops look at it differently. With jaundiced eye, in fact. They figure that any number of hot suspects are living there these days, on the lam and taking advantage of Brisbane's unincorporated status. We have few facts and figures to quote and comments to make that we would like to have you verify and, from what you learn to be the true facts, write an int eresting article (the good neighbor story, if you wish) for your readers to read and permit them to have a pleasant and tasteful story to discuss over their morning cup of coffee instead of an ill tasting story with a good cup of coffee which akes them both bad with which to start a good day.

So, Brisbane is a ho hum hamlet. If this was true the good people of Brisbane would be the first ones to take note and do something about it. Have you visit Brisbane lately? If not, come down and see us sometime and get some first hand news from any one or all of the following places:

The Brisbane Elementary School (some day we will have a High School but give us time, we are young yet) is one of the most active and progressive schools in the State of California. This is accomplished by having a very well educated and alert School Board made up of Brisbane citizens. The Brisbane Lions Club this active organization of Brisbane businessmen meets every other Monday evening. Visit them and find out some of the things they are doing to keep this "ho hum" hamlet asleep.

Brisbane American Legion post and Auxiliary No. 473 Come out and look over the new Legion Hall and visit them any time, see what they are doing for the boys and girls and all other civic activities to keep this "hamlet" asleep.

The Brisbane V.F.W. They have regular meetings too. They are brand new but, just watch them go.

The Brisbane P.T.A. If you can find a more active and progressive organization anywhere just let us know first hand.

Other activities in Brisbane that have developed and became very active through the thoughtfulness of the first seven groups listed above--

The Brisbane Fire Department (sponsors of Troop 134, Boy Scouts of America). Did you ever see a fire extinguished up on a high hill without any water pressure. Check up on the membership of this organization and find out how "ho hum" they are.

The Brisbane ambulance squad have saved many lives through their efficient and prompt action responding to calls.

The Brisbane Police Commission This is new too but just check the progress they have made in the past few months and see what you find out.

The Brisbane Water District Another new activity, Director election April 4th, but they are ready, willing and very able.

Boy Scout, Cub Scout, Air Scout Troop 134, San Francisco Area Council Check with Scout Headquarters, 105 Montgomery Street, San Francisco.

Girl Scout, Troops 1 and 2 and Brownie Unit They have a program and play "The Blue Bird planned for May. Watch for it and come on out.

The Brisbane Recreation Center Ther e is some supervis ed activity going on here every day and night. Come out and look over their new baseball facilities. The people responsible for this sure must have been pretty "ho hum" to secure such a nice place for the Boys, Girls and Adults of Brisbane to have such pleasant social and healthful activities.

The B.S.A. C.S.A. No 134 Brisbane Drum and Bugle Corps This "ho hum "organization is made up of and the membership is limited to Boy Scouts of Troop 134 and Girl Scouts of Troops 1 and 2 and if you will check back over some of the parades in San Francisco in 1948 and through the files of some of the ChronicleChronicle's photographers you might find a very interesting story. OWN A BUSINESS? CONSIDER THESE RETIREMENT PLANS

If you own a small business or are self-employed, you've always got plenty to do, but you can't forget about the days when you'll be less busy — that is, when you're retired. How can you prepare for that time of your life?

One key step is establishing a retirement plan for your business or yourself. And thanks to the 2022 SECURE 2.0 Act, you can now receive tax credits for opening and administering a 401(k), SEP-IRA or SIMPLE IRA. These aren't the only plans available for small businesses or sole proprietors, but they are among the most popular. Let's look at each of them:

• 401(k) – A 401(k) offers several key benefits: First, any earnings growth is tax deferred, and your contributions can be tax deductible. (Taxes are due upon withdrawal, and withdrawals prior to age $59\frac{1}{2}$ may be subject to a 10% penalty.)

If you choose a Roth 401(k), your contributions aren't deductible, but your earnings and withdrawals will be tax free, provided you meet certain conditions. And a 401(k) offers a variety of investment options. If you have workers, you'll need to consider whether to offer matching contributions, which are tax deductible to you, up to the limit of 25% of compensation paid to eligible employees.

But even if you're self-employed, with no employees other than your spouse, you can establish what's known as a "solo" or "owner-only" 401(k). In 2023, you can put in up to \$22,500 as an employee, plus a catch-up contribution of \$7,500 if you're 50 or older, for a total of \$30,000. Plus, you can contribute an additional 25% of earned income as an employer, up to an overall employee and employer maximum of \$66,000 (or \$73,500 if you're 50 or older).

• **SEP-IRA** – An SEP-IRA may be attractive to you if you're self-employed or if you own a business but have few or no employees. That's because you must contribute an equal percentage of your own compensation to every eligible employee. In 2023, you can contribute up to \$66,000 or 25% of your income, whichever is less.

• SIMPLE IRA — A SIMPLE IRA is easy to establish and administer. As with an SEP-IRA, earnings in a SIMPLE IRA can grow on a tax-deferred basis. If you have employees, they aren't required to contribute to this plan — but you are. You must match up to 3% of employees' contributions or provide 2% of their annual salaries, although you do have some flexibility. If your business goes through a rough patch, you can temporarily decrease SIMPLE IRA contributions to 1% for up to two years out of the previous five. Your contributions to your employees' accounts are tax deductible, but in in terms of building resources for your own retirement, a SIMPLE IRA may be less appealing because of its contribution limits, which are relatively low compared to a 401(k) or SEP IRA. In 2023, you can put in up to \$15,500, or \$19,000 if you're 50 or older.

You should consult with your tax advisor to determine which retirement plan is right for you. Your financial advisor can also help you explore your options. And the sooner you put a plan to work, the better.

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



BRISBANE BUILDING EFFICIENCY PROGRAM GOES BEYOND

Brisbane's Building Efficiency Program, a city initiative launched in 2019, addresses energy and water use in existing buildings to help make them more efficient, thereby saving owners money, improving the safety and comfort of our building stock, and reducing emissions that are driving climate change. Since 2021 BBEP has required most non residential buildings to submit a benchmarking report on their energy and water use by May 15 annually.

This year, BBEP is phasing in "Beyond requirements which aim to help

inefficient buildings improve their energy and water usage and reward high performing ones. As the first step of the program's implementation, commercial properties were required to demonstrate they are high performance or undergo an audit by June 15, 2023, whereas Multi family and Industrial buildings will have to comply with the Beyond phase in spring 2024.

As of August 25, 87 out of 100 buildings are in compliance with Annual Benchmarking requirements, and 9 out of 21 Commercial buildings meet the new Beyond requirements. Staff are working with build ing owners and representatives to meet the requirements, and violations may be assessed for buildings not making progress towards compliance.

The Brisbane Building Efficiency Program map has also been updated with 2022 benchmarking data. The map displays t he compliance status as well as energy, water, and natural gas usage of buildings in the program to promote transparency and awareness surrounding consumption. 
